



Skipton Young Rotary Chef Competition





Jessica Fox, who is currently in Year 10 and studying GCSE Food Preparation & Nutrition, was selected to enter the 'Skipton Young Rotary Chef Competition.' Jessica did brilliantly and came second.

The competition was held at Craven College on Tuesday 7th February 2023, from 4-7pm. A number of students participated from neighbouring schools, including Craven College, Ermysted's Grammar, Settle and Upper Wharfedale.

The competition aims to encourage young people to:

- Learn how to cook
- Develop food presentation skills
- Consider food hygiene issues
- · Develop organisational and planning skills
- Develop an ability to cope in a demanding situation

Competitors were asked to prepare in two hours, a three-course healthy meal comprising starter, main course and dessert for two people and costing less than £22.00. They also had to complete a time plan and design a menu for the judges to review.

The competition was judged by three judges and points were awarded for the following categories:

- Costing
- Planning
- Healthy choice of dishes
- · Correct use of knives & equipment
- Meal served on time & at correct temperature
- Neatness of working area and hygiene
- · Range of skills used
- Taste and presentation of starter
- Taste and presentation of main course
- · Taste and presentation of dessert

Jessica's starter was Tomato Soup and she made 'Fish tray bake' for the main course; a complex dish that included shelling and deveining prawns. Dessert was chocolate mousse with shortbread. All three dishes were executed to a very high standard and beautifully presented. Jessica is a credit to school. Well done on achieving this success!

CyberFirst Regional Finals

On Saturday 4th February a team of Year 8 students ventured to Sheffield Hallam University to compete in the national finals of the Cyber First Girls Competition. The team consisted of Emilia Davies, Lena Parys, Betty Oxley and Margot Cranham.

To get to this stage of the competition the team had successfully seen off competition from thousands of challengers in the 2023 CyberFirst Competition, which is run by the National Cyber Security Centre (NCSC), a part of GCHQ.

The competition aims to inspire girls aged 12 and 13 to pursue their interests in technology and pursue a career in cyber security, where women make up just 22% of the workforce.

This year's contest was entered by over 8,700 girls from across the four nations of the UK, and saw pupils tackle challenges covering topics from cryptography and logic to artificial intelligence and networking.

Overall, the team ended up in fifth place. They worked incredibly hard in preparation for the finals and all throughout the original rounds of the competition. We are incredibly proud of their hard work and achievement.

The competition was held at Sheffield Hallam University and involved problem solving using various programming and coding techniques in Cyber Chef and Python. It was interesting to learn about cyber security and how this may be applied in certain careers. Later in the day we were introduced to Melanie Oldham OBE, the CEO of a cyber security company - Bob's Business - based in Barnsley, who told us some cyber security jobs pay over £1500 per day!

In summary, it was an informative day and we enjoyed competing. Moreover, I now understand how important it is that companies are cyber secure, not least so people can get on with their jobs without important information falling into the wrong hands.






A pocket of people in a pocket of a world that's as small as a marble. We are tiny and we are everything.

The Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing 2023

The Library and the English Department are excited to announce that SGHS will this year be taking part in the Yoto Carnegie Shadowing Scheme.

The Yoto Carnegie Medal for Writing – the UK's longest running children's book award – recognises outstanding reading experiences created through writing in books for children and young people. The prize, which is judged by librarians, has previously been awarded to writers including Elizabeth Acevedo, Sally Gardner, C.S. Lewis, Arthur Ransome, Terry Pratchett, Philip Pullman and Noel Streatfeild.

Running in libraries and schools alongside the professional judging process, the shadowing initiative engages thousands of children and young people nationally (and internationally) in reading the books on the shortlist via reading groups and posting their reviews online. Each year, young people who take part in the scheme are invited to vote for their favourite books to win the Shadowers' Choice Award, which is announced alongside the Medal winner at the annual winners' ceremony.

The Skipton Shadows (our group name!) will read, debate and discuss the eight shortlisted books in a weekly lunchtime group with our librarian, English teachers and dedicated sixth-form literacy leaders (Jess Ebel, Sara Hussain and Phoebe Pickles). We also plan to run activities and competitions that tie in with the book selection.

The twenty longlisted books will be announced on 15th February and the eight shortlisted books on 15th March, when the shadowing will commence.
