
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Blooming Marvellous









Art Careers Talk by Ex Student Maddy White



Year 12 Politics Virtual Guest Speakers

What is a civil servant?

Ben Still – West Yorkshire Combined Authority Managing Director

While many people have heard, or indeed know someone who works in the Civil Service, it is often hard to define what exactly the jobs entails. To help us demystify their role, our Politics class was joined by Ben Still (a former civil servant currently working in local government). During our discussion with him, Mr Still explained that civil servants were essentially in charge of ensuring that the government of the day's pledges, set out in their manifesto, were fulfilled. Indeed, Still explained that civil servants primarily fall into two broad categories, policy implementation and policy scrutiny. He went on to explain that the civil service encompassed a broad variety of policy areas, such as: DVLA, education and the environment. If there is one thing to take away from our discussion with him, I would have to say that it is the diversity and flexibility of the civil service. Indeed, Mr Still reiterated that anyone can enter the civil service, careless of their prior career or even qualification, provided they had an interest in initiating policies that would directly influence how people live their day-to-day lives.



What does the role of an MP look like?

Julian Smith MP for Skipton and Ripon

In our first week back our Year 12 Politics class met with our local MP for Skipton and Ripon. We asked him questions on a range issues such as the day-to- day life of an MP and more recent debates surrounding the Police, Crime and Sentencing bill and how it will affect the right to protest. It was no surprise that the Covid-19 pandemic was a hot topic of discussion (especially concerning the uncertainty of exams and ending of lockdown) and we were also interested to hear about his past roles as Chief Whip and Secretary of State to Northern Ireland. It was a great opportunity to meet Mr Smith and gain a greater understanding of the mechanics of Parliament and the purpose of the Friday surgeries in constituencies (albeit quite different in light of the pandemic). It was especially enlightening for those wanting to go into a career in politics to gain a deeper understanding of how to gain vital work experience once restrictions have lifted.



What is the role of a Lord in the House of Lords?

Labour Lord Iain McNicol

On the 18th of June, the Year 12 Politics class met with Labour Lord lain McNicol, formerly the General Secretary for the Labour Party. We met with him (over teams) to learn about his role in the House of Lords and for him to answer our questions, mainly about younger issues such as the voting age, university fees and how the House of Lords needs to change moving forward.

Lord McNicol was given his peerage on 2018 after stepping down from his position as General Secretary. He was nominated by Jeremy Corbyn and initially took the position of the party's Opposition Whip, a position giving him the power to ensure the party is 'towing the line'. He later stepped down from this position in 2020 pending investigation into a government report regarding the Labour Party.

As Lord McNicol answered our questions, he noticed that as a class we focused on his positions on certain issues rather than simply his role in the House of Lords - it's a fair observation, we'd much rather learn about the Labour opinion in a Conservative led country rather than re-hash the information we learn in our lessons. Mostly the class focused on youth issues as mentioned previously, and overall he shared our opinions on these subjects. For the lowering of the voting age to 16, he expressed his support for this issue, citing the lowering of the voting age in the 2014 Scottish Independence referendum as evidence in favour of this issue. He also showed clear opinions on the composition of the House of Lords, expressing that reform needs to be made going forward to abolish 'the 92' – the number of remaining hereditary peers in the House – Lord Mc-Nicol also criticised the single use of the Lords Spiritual – Bishops given a political position without consideration for the diverse religious landscape of the UK. In the recent focus on personal statements and university talks including Higher Education week, his opinion on the question of University fees is becoming more of an issue for our generation every day. How is it that students in England, Wales or Ireland can pay up to £40,000 but Scotland can have no tuition fees? It's an interesting question, and Lord McNicol agreed, stating that this economic inequality did create a rift between the English and Scottish education systems, but devolution means that Scotland can use their funding how they see fit.

Through his answers we learnt about his opinion on many issues that will directly affect our generation in the future and assured us that there was still someone "trying to change the world (as his Twitter[™] bio states) "

The CREATE staff have been working hard to welcome students back into our classrooms in September. Due to Covid 19, we have missed being able to offer our students access to the DT workshops, the food technology room, and the art rooms.

Mrs Scott and Mr Durward have transformed the A level Art suite into a dynamic and modern Art studio to provide our students with an inspiring and personalised space.

In our DT Workshop, we have overhauled the workbenches to create a Mondrian inspired room. It now has a feature wall with a noise responsive infinity mirror built by Mr Mira and bespoke inspirational quotes printed on our new vinyl machine which will be accessible to our students in September.



EdTech Robotics

As part of our ongoing work as an EdTech Demonstrator school, we have been working with primary and secondary schools around the country to embed technology throughout schools and to use it to enhance and enrich the curriculum.

A recent offering to primary schools has been "Enriching the Science Curriculum using Technology". One of our local schools, Thornton in Craven primary, has been studying sustainability and recycling in Years 5 and 6. We visited the school to demonstrate how you can bring robotics into the classroom to engage our young people and get them to further embrace the challenges that we face through climate change.


Our day focused around being "Waste Wise", the children firstly looked at the landfill in Cateura in Paraguay and learnt the inspirational story of the Recycled Orchestra where the local community built instruments from recycled rubbish and now tour the world playing to large audiences. We then set up a number of robotics challenges for the students to engage with.

They had to work in teams to program their Mindstorms robot to sort through "lego landfill" and deliver items to different recycling points around the classroom. This used teamwork, programming, logic and problem-solving skills and gave the students an experience to enjoy and remember.





Year 7 and 8

Year 7 students have all read 'Northern Lights' in English this year, whilst Year 8 students have been reading 'Noughts and Crosses'. Both of these novels are part of a series, so if you are in Year 7, why not pick up the second novel in the trilogy – 'The Subtle Knife' – and find out where Lyra's adventures go next. Likewise, if you are in Year 8 and enjoyed 'Noughts and Crosses,' why not pick up the second novel in the quartet – 'Knife Edge' – and find out what happens to Sephy next...

If you are looking for a novel featuring a rebellious female protagonist, why not try **'The Lie Tree' by Frances Hardinge**. 'The Lie Tree' is set in the patriarchal, scientific society of Victorian Britain. Protagonist Faith's father is found dead under mysterious circumstances, and Faith determines to find out the cause of his death as well as to discover the nature of his scientific investigations, hoping, in the process, to save her family name and fortune. Combining historical and fantasy genres, this is a gripping, entertaining and fascinating read!

If you are looking for a story about friendship, courage and self-belief to read this summer, **'A Kind of Spark' by Elle McNicholl** has just won the Waterstones children's book prize. It tells the story of 11-year-old Addie as she campaigns for a memorial to the witch trials that took place in her Scottish hometown. Addie knows there's more to the story of these 'witches', just like there is more to hers. Can Addie challenge how the people in her town see her, and make her voice heard? Addie's story was born from the writer's own experiences of neurodiversity and her commitment to seeing greater representation in children's books.





Year 9

Year 9 students have studied either 'Of Mice and Men' or 'To Kill a Mockingbird' this year. Why not develop your knowledge of American modern classics and try **'The Great Gatsby' by F Scott Fitzgerald** over the summer? Generally considered to be F. Scott Fitzgerald's finest novel, 'The Great Gatsby' is narrated by Nick Carraway and takes the reader into the superficially glittering world of the mansions which lined the Long Island shore in 1920s New York. Nick Carraway recounts his relationships with Daisy Buchanan, her brash but wealthy husband Tom Buchanan and most of all his relationship with Jay Gatsby and the mystery that surrounds him...



KS4 and KS5

If you are looking for the perfect escape from GCSEs and A Levels, check out **Meg Rosoff's latest novel: 'The Great Godden'.** This is an effortless summer read and a perfect coming of age tale for fans of 'Call me by your name', 'Normal People' and 'I Capture the Castle'. This is the story of one family and one dreamy summer when everything changes... In a holiday house by the sea, in a big, messy family, one teenager watches as brothers and sisters, parents and older cousins fill hot days with wine and games and planning a wedding. Enter the Goddens – irresistible and charming Kit and surly, silent Hugo. Suddenly there's a serpent in paradise - and the consequences will be devastating for everyone...
