Bletchley Park, The National Museum of Computing and Alton Towers Computer Science Trip

Bletchley Park

On Sunday 17th October, 30 of our Year 10 and 11 Computer Science students travelled to Bletchley Park and The National Museum of Computing.

Bletchley Park was home to the code breakers of World War II and was the secret hub where servicemen and women used the Engima machine, Bombe and Collossus to crack coded messages, giving us vital information on German and Japanese battle plans and targets. Together with its links with Alan Turing, father of the computer and founder of the field of artificial intelligence, Bletchley Park is a terrific destination for our Computer Science students.

During our time there we visited the Mansion where the rooms appear as they were during WWII. The Library is preserved as it was when used as a wartime Naval Intelligence Office and we explored the Ballroom, transformed into a film set for The Imitation Game in 2013.

We also had to opportunity to visit some of the huts which were among the most secret areas of Bletchley Park and where the crucial code breaking activities took place. Inside the huts we visited Alan Turin's office, and our students could learn how the code breakers decrypted German messages and test their own code breaking skills.





The National Museum of Computing

In the afternoon we took part in a guided tour and an interactive workshop at The National Museum of Computing. The museum is located on the Bletchley Park site and houses the world's largest collection of functional historic computers, including the rebuilt Colossus, the world's first electronic computer, and the WITCH, the world's oldest working digital computer.

Our students were able to follow the development of computing from the ultra-secret pioneering efforts of the 1940s through the large systems and mainframes of the 1950s, 60s and 70s, and the rise of personal computing in the 1980s and beyond.

We took part in the learning programme for schools and colleges, aimed to inspire the next generation of computer scientists and engineers. This included a hands-on workshop where students used vintage BBC micro machines and the BBC Basic programming language to create a game of snake.

We also took part in a guided tour, discovering 70 years of computer development through World War 2 Codebreaking Machines, First Generation computers and more. This tour includes:- The Bombe, Tunny, Colossus, WITCH, Elliott 903, PC Gallery and Retro Games.



That evening we stayed at the YHA in Stratford Upon Avon and took park in a remote talk on The Wicker Man rollercoaster which was due to take place at Alton Towers but was cancelled due to COVID 19.

The students went "behind the scenes" and discovered why the globally unique rollercoaster experience is so much more than a wooden rollercoaster. We discussed the advancements in technology that allowed The Wicker Man rollercoaster to provide a completely different experience that stimulates all senses. We learnt all about its design, the challenges it presented and the new thrills it delivers, ahead of our visit to Alton Towers on the Sunday to experience the ride first-hand.









Alton Towers

On Monday 18th October we travelled to Alton Towers Theme Park. Students enjoyed the rides and were given educational packs to look at the engineering of different rollercoasters and the digital effects and programming involved in creating these experiences.

Careers focus

The whole trip had careers focus and students were asked to consider the different careers that they have been exposed to during our visit. They researched into a diverse set of inspired careers from rollercoaster engineering to cryptography.

It was fantastic to be able to take our students on a trip again!


KS3 Creative Power Writers!

Hannah is studying Maths, Physics & Biology at A level, as she is looking to progress in the Biomedical field of Engineering. Hannah's mentor throughout her A Levels is Depuy Synthes UK, which specialise within the medical sector. To gain further valuable knowledge within Engineering, through her Wednesday afternoon placement, Hannah is working at Sigmat in Skipton.

So why apply to the Arkwright Scholarship?

The application process begins with the completion of an application form by January, followed by a 2 Hour Aptitude Test in February. Successful students will then be invited to an interview at a top university. This can be a daunting process, but you will be supported throughout by Mr Braden.

New Teacher Trainees

September saw 26 fantastic trainees start their teaching careers with Northern Lights SCITT.

We've been incredibly impressed with how they have thrown themselves into the course, not least at our team building day at Nell Bank! Their training has covered a wealth of learning already, including Safeguarding, Behaviour Management, SEND and how pupils learn. Thank you to our colleagues both within the Trust and further afield for delivering some of our professional learning sessions; our trainees are getting such a high quality programme!

Our trainees have now started their placements in schools and are very lucky to have superb mentoring and support from the teams in schools. This year the SCITT has developed new links with schools in Lancashire and we're delighted to be working with the Pendle Education Trust and Barrowford Primary School. We have an increasing number of applicants who live in Lancashire and will benefit from excellent placements nearer to home.

On 12th October applications for the 2022-2023 courses opened. We have expanded our range of courses available, including the addition of Secondary Art and Design. We asked our current trainees how they would describe the Northern Lights training experience.

Our new trainee's responses have been incredible and testimony to the hard work of all the SCITT team and schools:



Friends of SGHS are glad to support the refurbishment of the art department's attic space this term, donating £700 to renew, repaint and install workstations and large art display boards. Thank you to all who supported our most recent fundraiser to raise the necessary funds. It looks great!

Sunday 17th October saw the first event of this academic year - our **Family Skipton Walking Trail**. Despite the autumnal weather, the turnout was great, and we are grateful for the donations from cake bakers within our school community and the meat & bread donations from Keelham, Morrisons and Tesco. A special thank you goes out to all those signed up and took part! **Together we raised a lovely £818** for the art space.

The trail raffle prize - a £30 M & S voucher - was won by Chloe Dias in Year 7. Well done, Chloe!

We currently have various funding pledges: raising funds for new tents for use by our DofE groups, at a cost of £500; aiming to support the engineering robotics competition, which will cost £150; and we will fund the end of year student award badges. £5,000 has recently been given to school to resurface the Hollow for use by our students for recreation and sports - it's wonderful to have this outdoor space finally renovated.

Our 150 club is going strong, raising around £1,000 this year. Thank you to all who have purchased 2021 numbers.
