ERA Foundation Award

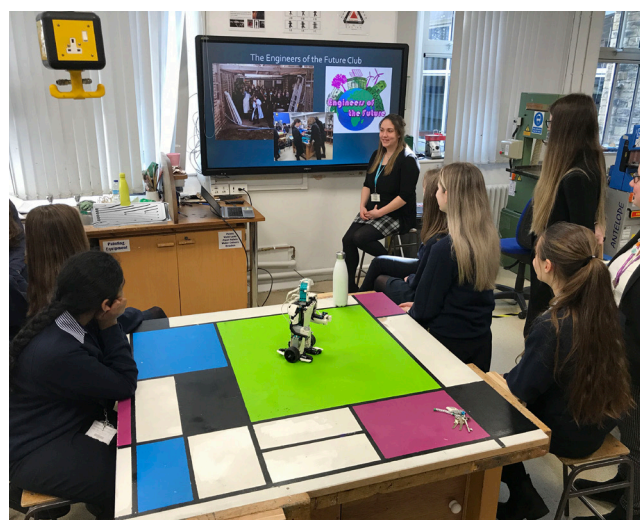
Skipton Girls' High School can boast of an unprecedented acclaim this week. They were delighted to be informed that Mrs Lofthouse has been awarded the ERA Foundation's 'David Clarke' prize for 'Outstanding Teacher in the Field of Engineering'.

As well as an award for Mrs Lofthouse, the school will receive £12,000 which will be used to support the SGHS 'Engineers of the Future' programme. Such a project aims to work on the Northern Star Academies Trust 'Green Promise', exploring engineering solutions for sustainability in schools.

Qualifying in 2015, Mrs Lofthouse took up her first placement at SGHS as a Computer Science teacher, creating an annual Engineering and Computing enrichment programme, which included trips to Bletchley Park and Legoland, Alton Towers and The National Museum of Computing.

Mrs Lofthouse began to look beyond the curriculum to embed programming, electronics, and bigger world application to the core. She went on to introduce the A level Computer Science course, the first cohort of A Level consisted of 5 students. With her supra-curricular provision, this number has risen to 10 and 14 in the last 2 years. Of the current A level cohort 80% of students have chosen to pursue Computer Science at university. Mrs Lofthouse and the team are passionate about addressing the dearth of women and women leaders in this sector nationally, something which the ERA Foundation praised Mrs Lofthouse for.

In 2016, she established the SGHS Robotics club. Over the past 5 years SGHS have won all rounds of the Lego League competition and qualified for the National Finals. This year the club had a record 54 members.



As Learning Director, Mrs Lofthouse and her team have launched a programme called "The Engineers of the Future". Its aim, to build additions to the school that will reduce the carbon footprint. The first and current project is the "Generate Gym" which involves transforming a courtyard into an energy generating gym. Mrs Lofthouse is leading the students to innovate, build, fundraise and upcycle to achieve their vision.

Mrs Lofthouse runs sessions with primary schools to introduce robotics and coding and annually organises a Spectacular STEM Day where over 400 pupils from over 40 primary schools have attended, experiencing diverse and engaging STEM challenges.

Skipton Girls' High School feel very lucky to celebrate such a high profile and worthwhile prize and project within our staff body and look forward to building the engineers of the future with our inspired, eco-motivated student body.

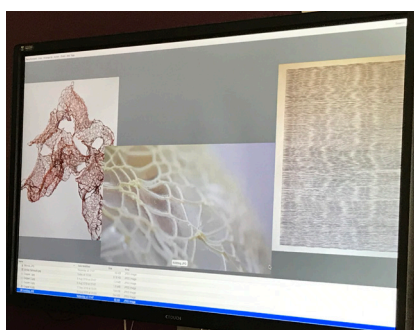
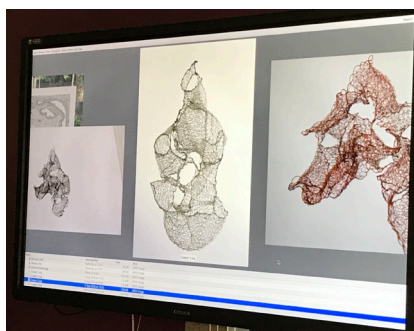

I found the show very engaging. It was very different from what I had expected because it applied maths to all kinds of real-life situations from covid statistics to juggling!

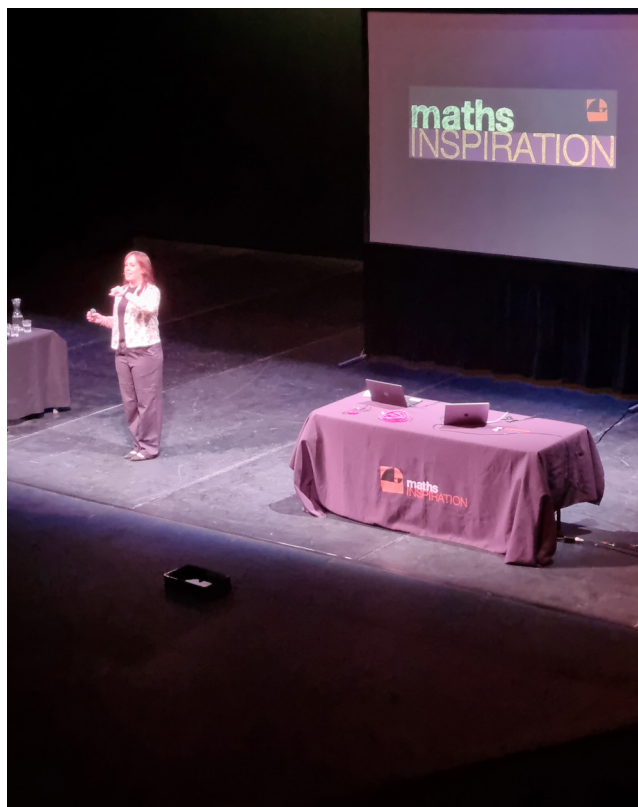
Was it what you expected?

Professional Photographer in School

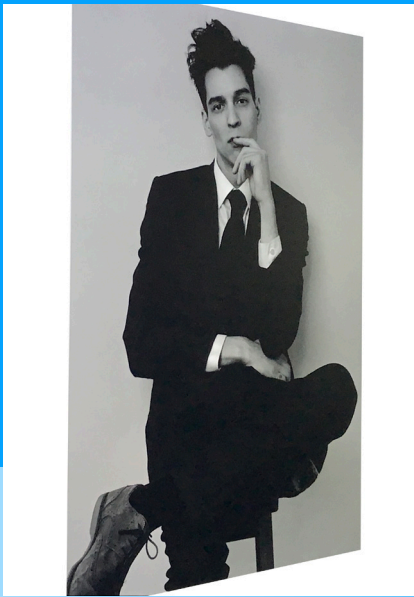

Macbeth

Year 10 Theatre Trip to the Leeds Playhouse

Here are some short reviews written by our Year 10 theatre critics!

Lois 10V

Amy Leach's production of *Macbeth* was successful in its experimental and accessible goals. From the incredible lighting, to set and costume design, to the intimacy between the characters, this production brought nuance to the play.

Amy Leach's production of *Macbeth* is a modernised adaption of the famous classic of *Macbeth*. Leach uses stage placement and lighting to create an atmosphere that is engaging for the audience and brings about continual dramatic tension. The modernisation of this adaption is also highlighted by the diversity of the cast and the natural chemistry they hold.

Jessica Baglow's *Lady Macbeth* and Tachia Newall's *Macbeth* both show their characters drift apart in the play. In the beginning of the play, their relationship is full of affection and love and both these emotions die out as the play continues and the performance portrays their downfall well, creating a sombre mood in the audience.

On March 17th, the English Department took Year 10 to see Amy Leach's new production of 'Macbeth' starring Tachia Newall and Jessica Baglow, at the Leeds Playhouse.

A wonderful time was had by all and we were very relieved that the production went ahead – the performance the night before had been cancelled owing to Covid-19 amongst the cast – so we had the special addition of Amy Leach herself introducing the performance! The actor playing Lennox came on script-in-hand and did a phenomenal job on only a few hours of rehearsals.

Amy Leach makes sure to create the most inclusive environment. There was a set back with one of the cast testing positive for Covid – I think both the understudy and all characters in the play improvised well with this. The use of the set makes it so that the audience can clearly see and understand what is going on at all times with the spotlight making it clear who was put forward and what they were thinking.

The levels in the play were used to reflect the hierarchy of the characters. The hydraulic stage in the middle was used by the people in power, when lifted, such as King Duncan, and Macbeth, when he became King. The use of lighting, too, was complementary to this feature. When the stage was lifted, King Macbeth, was standing at the top, while the others were dining underneath the stage, and the light did not reach them. The light could represent knowing, and the absence of light, unknowing. Macbeth knew what he was going to do, while the other characters were oblivious.

Emilia 10A

Amy Leach's production gave the audience and cast members an opportunity to see and be involved in accessible acting. All types of audience were able to watch the production of Macbeth and enjoy it. This gave it a more inclusive and welcoming feel, which completes what they aim for at the Playhouse linking to their slogan: 'We are home.'

Emily 10A

Jessica Baglow's Lady Macbeth creates a much more tender and loving atmosphere around her character rather than the manipulative characterisation audiences have seen from this character before. This makes the emotional sleepwalking scene even more heart-wrenching and allows audiences to sympathise with this complex character.

Rimsha 10A

Shahbaaz Khan's acting skills presented the maturing of Malcolm throughout the play very well showing different emotions when he was fleeing the country after his father's death, to building his own army and finally regaining the throne.

Esme 10R

Leach's production is inclusive, mesmerising and engaging and captures the viewers' attention whilst amazing the audience. The use of hydraulics in the staging (the moving ramp/platform) help the audience to understand the hierarchy and the characters' importance in the production at certain times in the play. I also loved how she touched on the theme of miscarriage which isn't always explored in other productions. The use of deaf actors and sign language widened the audience and helped all viewers understand the language better.

Jasmine 10A

The dramatic use of lighting and sound created suspense and interest in the audience which otherwise could have been lost in the Shakespearean language. Inclusivity was also beautifully worked into the play in a way which made it really feel part of the production.

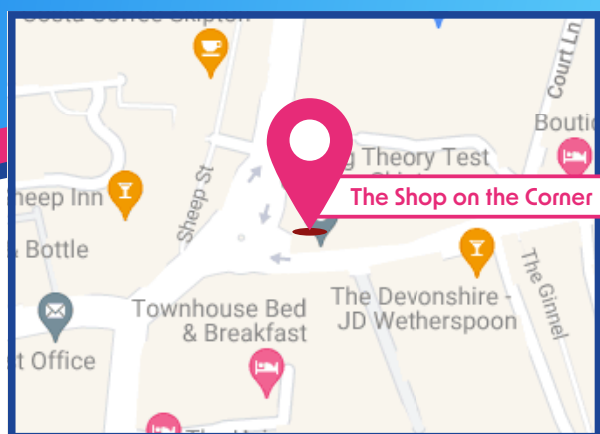

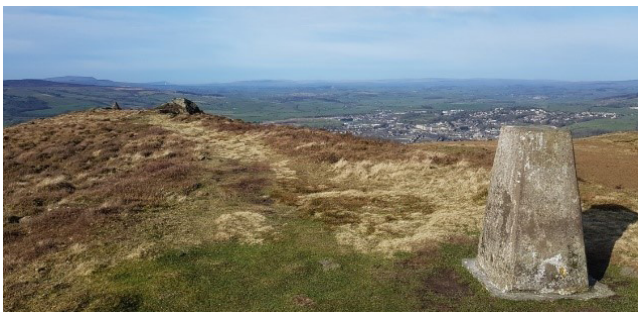
