It is a truly incredible achievement to mark 70 years as Monarch and something that is unlikely to happen again, certainly in my lifetime! I have always admired the Queen's devotion to public service, particularly in light of all the challenges and changes that will have taken place over the last 70 years.

As a school we will be marking and celebrating this historic event through an afternoon tea event for students and staff on the afternoon of Monday 6th June. This will include food (provided by school), dance performances from across the 7 decades, a themed quiz and music from the decades. SGHS CAREERS FAIR

The Careers Fair held on Wednesday 27th April was a huge success with over thirty businesses and Higher/Further education institutions participating and hundreds of students and parents attending.

It was one of the first big school events held face to face since the Covid pandemic and was a really positive experience providing students and parents with a fantastic chance to ask questions and explore all future pathways and opportunities available.

There was a great 'buzz' in the air as the students and parents interacted with the many representatives from the organisations across a diverse range of businesses and using varied career paths including architecture, finance, engineering, digital marketing, medicine, the armed forces and environmental consultancy to name but a few.

Local firms were represented alongside national and multi-national organisations - many of whom offer apprenticeship options as an alternative career pathway and were fascinating about the opportunities on offer. Further Education providers, Craven College and numerous Higher Education providers, including the Universities of Newcastle, Northumbria, Leeds Trinity, Lancaster, Leeds, Bradford, Lincoln, Edge Hill and York St John were all very busy and informative about students potential next steps.

Presentations from careers as varied as the RAF & the Army; Shoo Social (digital marketing); Comply Direct (environmental consultancy); JN Bentley; various of the Universities; Kingsway and Ashland Vets were all very informative and well-attended demonstrating the huge wealth of experiences out in the wider world beyond school. It was also lovely to see some 'old girls' returning and attending as representatives from different businesses including Mazars, Laing O'Rourke and Chelker Technology. These ex-students were all thriving having taken the Apprenticeship route into their career of choice and represented their organisations with pride, enthusiastically extolling the many virtues of their chosen pathway, whilst nostalgic about their SGHS experience.

Overall, the Careers Fair was a valuable opportunity enabling our students to begin to make sensible and informed decisions about their future and considering their careers aspirations.

National Prize for one of our Learning Directors



CREATE Learning Director Rebecca Lofthouse collects acclaimed national prize for empowering women in the world of CREATE.

This week, Rebecca Lofthouse and I travelled to London in pursuit of the renowned 'David Clarke Award' for successes in engineering, computing and technology in the world of teaching.

Rebecca was shortlisted for the award following her work on our 'NSAT Green Promise', within which she has established a student-led group ('Engineers of the Future'), who will lead on various sustainability projects across the school. Excitingly, the team have plans to design and build a completely self-sufficient gym, install kinetic flooring into our school site and longer term looking at installing electric charging points in the school.

Rebecca quickly became the favourite for the award, boasting of impressive destinations for her computing

groups, whereby 80% of her current cohort are going on to study computing-related degrees after their examinations. This was considered "highly impressive" by the awarding officials, who recognised the failures in the world of STEM to empower women as leaders in these fields.

As a school, we are very lucky to have Rebecca in our staff body and she continues to enrich our school community with her innovative outlook and passion for CREATE.

A Level Geography Fieldwork

Part of A Level Geography is taking students out of the classroom to carry out fieldwork related to the content we are covering in class. For many students this fieldwork brings difficult concepts to life, and really helps develop their understanding. As part of the A Level Geography course, students need to also carry out fieldwork in preparation for completing their NEA.

Over the last 2 weeks, we have taken our Year 12 Geography classes out of the classroom on two fieldwork days. The first was to look at the factors affecting infiltration, and we took them to Wycoller County Park to collect our data. We were able to record infiltration rates, as well as assess the percentage of vegetation cover and measure the gradient of the slope at each. Back in the classroom, students have written up their work as a report, using some of the skills required for their NEA.

The second day of fieldwork was to Grasmere in the Lake District. Students completed a 5.8 mile circular walk from the village of Grasmere to Easedale Tarn and back. The aim of this was to look for evidence of glaciation within the landscape, and carry out primary data collection techniques so we can evaluate this evidence back in the classroom, and use this example as a case study. Students measured the orientation of striations, completed a till analysis, and used grid references and observational skills to record evidence seen. It was a fantastic day, despite the small amount of rain at the tarn whilst eating lunch! Many of the students had never been to Easedale, and the look of amazement as they stepped over the corrie lip to see the corrie and tarn for the first time was brilliant. Some commented on how they didn't expect it to look the way it does, and how bigger in real life it is, compare to what they were expecting! Back down in Grasmere village, they treated themselves to a well deserved ice cream or hot chocolate.





We now look forward to the remainder of the summer term, and taking out our Year 8 students to Malham, and our Year 10 students to Wycoller to complete a river study.

On 27th and 28th April 70 students from Year 7 and Yar 8 took part in the Junior Maths Challenge, a nationwide competition run by the United Kingdom Maths Trust. The students achieved impressive results with 9 Gold awards, 20 Silver awards and 19 Bronze awards. 

Gold Arts Award


