For some of the attending students, it was their first time in a secondary school environment with exposure to our Science labs and Robotics facilities.

Throughout the day our visiting students took part in four different engaging and enriching STEM based sessions. These included a Houdini inspired Escape Room, a logic-based maths challenge, a Jurassic robotics competition and a "Smelly Science" make your own scent activity.

The conference was held at Ewood Park and the day consisted of stalls, exhibitions, talks and performances all of which our students took part in. The day is aimed at providing a platform for sharing skills, knowledge, and experience in promoting education for sustainable development in schools. It encourages environmental education and learning outside the classroom, with an emphasis on real world links to jobs and future career prospects.

Our students set up one of our energy generating bikes on their stand, which proved hugely popular and then presented to other schools and industry representatives about the current energy gym project at SGHS which is now firmly under construction.

There were multiple different activities that the Year 12s were able to take part in, whilst developing skills that will be essential in multiple work settings in the near future. Over the afternoon the Year 12s had a choice of activities, including an apprenticeship workshop, where the students were able to learn more about the benefits and opportunities of apprenticeships.

After much input, analysing books in the 0-5 age category over the decades and looking at under-representation of differing groups of people or ideas, our Year 10s set out to write a hugely diverse range of books.

Students enjoyed sharing their stories from their childhood, many students speaking particularly fondly of the Julia Donaldson range! They were shocked, though, to hear how there is greater representation of animal characters, rather than BAME characters in children's fiction.


Sparked by some short clips from BBC Radio 4 'Woman's Hour', BBC documentary 'No more boys and no more girls' and an interview with the Italian authors behind the popular 'Goodnight Stories for Rebel Girls', students also engaged in interesting debates about when gendered ideals are set in early childhood and what role children's fiction has in cementing these ideals.




